What is "Federal Consistency"?

Federal actions, in or outside the coastal zone, that affect any land or water use or natural resource of a state's coastal zone must be consistent with the enforceable policies of the state Coastal Management programs.

See CZMA § 307 (16 U.S.C. § 1456)





The Core Idea (Reverse Federalism)

- ➤ Certain federal actions cannot be undertaken without being found consistent with the State's enforceable coastal policies.
 - Direct (ACOE dredging)
 - Authoritative (permit issuance)
 - Funding to a state or local gov't (HUD funding)
 - Outer Continental Shelf plans (oil & gas, renewables)
- ➤ The State uses this authority as ONE means of implementing its plans





New York Coastal Management Program


- Adopted in 1982
- Incorporates multiple state laws into one set of policy statements (44 policies)
- Required the passage of Article 42 of the NYS executive law
- Incorporates special management areas





The Coastal Area

- All tidal waters (Hudson R. to Troy)
- Lakes Ontario and Erie
- St. Lawrence and Niagara Rivers
- Certain tributaries to these waters
- Roughly 1,000 feet inland from these waters

Federal Consistency Reviews

- Federal Agency Actions (direct action, ACOE dredging)
- Federal Permitting Actions (ACOE permit)
- Federal Financial Assistance to State & Local Gov'ts (HUD funding, EPA grant)
- Outer Continental Shelf Plans (oil & gas, renewables)





Federal Permitting Actions

- An APPLICANT for a federal permit on this list must CERTIFY that they will conduct their activity in a manner fully consistent with all 44 coastal policies or policies within an applicable Local Waterfront Revitalization Program (LWRP).
- No balancing
- DOS concurs with, conditionally concurs with, objects to, or objects with alternatives within 6 months of receipt of complete application
- Concurrence is "conclusively presumed" if longer than 6 months
 - Can "stay" the time clock by mutual consent
- If objection, federal agency may not authorize the activity (applicant may appeal State objection to U.S. Secretary of Commerce)





A Complete DOS Application Contains

- Completed Federal Consistency Assessment Form
- Copy of Federal Application (i.e., Joint Application for Permit)
- Detailed description
- Statement of purpose and need
- Analysis of alternatives
- Location map
- Site map / diagrams
- Color photos
- Identify all abutting owners
- Final Environmental Impact Statement (if required)
- Copies of any NYS application for permits (DEC, OGS, SHPO, etc.)

Federal Consistency Assessment Form

An applicant, seeking a permit, license, waiver, certification or similar type of approval from a federal agency whit is subject to the New York State Coastal Management Program (CMP), shall complete this assessment form for a proposed activity that will occur within and/or directly affect the State's Coastal Area. This form is intended assist an applicant in certifying that the proposed activity is consistent with New York State's CMP as required I U.S. Department of Commerce regulations (15 CFR 930.57). It should be completed at the time when the feder application is prepared. The Department of State will use the completed form and accompanying information in review of the applicant's certification of consistency.

D. ADDITIONAL STEPS

- If all of the questions in Section C are answered "NO", then the applicant or agency shall complete Section E and submit the documentation required by Section F.
- 2. If any of the questions in Section C are answered "YES", then the applicant or agent is advised to consult the CMP, or where appropriate, the local waterfront revitalization program document*. The proposed activity must be analyzed in more detail with respect to the applicable state or local coastal policies. On a separate page(s), the applicant or agent shall: (a) identify, by their policy numbers, which coastal policies are affected by the activity, (b) briefly assess the effects of the activity upon the policy; and, (c) state how the activity is consistent with each policy. Following the completion of this written assessment, the applicant or agency shall complete Section E and submit the documentation required by Section F.

E. CERTIFICATION

The applicant or agent must certify that the proposed activity is consistent with the State's CMP or the approved local waterfront revitalization program, as appropriate. If this certification cannot be made, the proposed activity shall not be undertaken. If this certification can be made, complete this Section.

"The proposed activity complies with New York State's approved Coastal Management Program, or with the applicable approved local waterfront revitalization program, and will be conducted in a manner consistent with such program."

F. SUBMISSION REQUIREMENTS

- The applicant or agent shall submit the following documents to the New York State Department of State Office of Planning and Development, Attn: Consistency Review Unit, One Commerce Plaza-Suite 1010, 99 Washington Avenue, Albany, New York 12231.
 - a. Copy of original signed form.
 - b. Copy of the completed federal agency application.
 - c. Other available information which would support the certification of consistency.

Basic DOS Application Review Sequence

- Application submission
- Completeness determination
 - Within 30 days and limited to Necessary Data and Information (NDI)
- Request for information (if necessary)
- General Concurrence (GC) review
- Public notice (up to 45 days) if not GC eligible
- Comment review and response (if any)
- Consistency decision





General Permit For Great Lakes Erosion Control

- No DOS review if Emergency General Permit applies
- Justification and need for project
- Evidence of erosion, not only flooding
- Replace / reconstruct in-place or landward

Consider alternatives that also benefit neighboring properties, coastal processes, and ecosystem functions.

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Federal Permitting Actions – DOS Decision

- General Concurrence
 - Abbreviated review
 - No public notice required
- Nationwide Permits & Regional Permits
 - Established conditions on certain permits
 - Some require DOS review, some do not.

Federal Permitting Actions – DOS Decision

- Concurrence
 - Public Notice required
 - If conditional, applicant's refusal of conditions turn it to objection
- Objections
 - Public Notice required
 - Encouraged to identify alternatives that are consistent





Federal Permitting Actions – Appeals

- Federal Agency CANNOT issue permit or funds over State's objection unless the decision is overridden by US Sec. of Commerce
 - Consistent with the objectives or purposes of Coastal Zone Management Act (CZMA)
 - Significantly and substantially furthers national interest
 - Interests outweigh adverse coastal effects
 - No reasonable alternatives
 - Necessary in the interest of national security

LWRP policies are locally-refined & enforceable versions of the 44 State coastal policies





The Coastal Policies

- All coastal policies are enforceable by NYS Law
- Not a parts per million decision
- Guidance language advises, but does not control
- A project must be consistent with all policies (or N/A)
- Objections must be based on policy



Special Management Areas





Local Waterfront Revitalization Programs

- Municipality (1 or more) based local refinement of coastal policies
 - Can be completed in the coastal area or on a designated inland waterway.
 - Only those within the coastal area can be federally approved
 - Only those that are federally approved are binding on federal actions
- Requires communities to develop local consistency laws for their own actions



Significant Coastal Fish and Wildlife Habitats

- Areas designated by DOS upon recommendation by DEC that have special characteristics
- Incorporates comments from federal agencies
- A specific coastal policy applies if action is within or affecting the habitat
- The whole habitat is considered, not individual species.
- Species considered during designation
- Policy 7 affords the same protection to all Significant Coastal Fish and Wildlife (200+)
