LONG BEACH **Film screenings** examine storm prep

The New York Sea Grant program is hosting two screenings in Long Beach tomorrow of a documentary examining why people did not evacuate during superstorm Sandy and how disaster preparers can get residents to better heed storm warnings.

The 23-minute Coastal Storm Awareness documentary will be shown at 2 and 7:30 p.m. at the Long Beach Library, 111 West Park Avenue.

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration granted \$1.8 million to Sea Grant programs in New York, New Jersey and Connecticut after Sandy to conduct 10 social science research projects about the reaction to Sandy evacuation orders and how to improve the public's response to warnings about storm hazards.

The research showed that mandatory evacuation orders

were most effective and that under voluntary evacuation notices the response was low. It also found that people were less likely to evacuate if they were elderly, disabled or had pets, according to a trailer for the documentary.

The first screening will be followed by a question and answer session with Hofstra University researchers Christa Farmer, Elizabeth Ploran and Mary Anne Trasciatti.

The evening screening will feature a discussion panel introduced by New York Sea Grant director Bill Wise. The panel will include representatives from Columbia and Yale universities, the National Hurricane Center, the Center for Independence of the Disabled, the Long Beach Latino Civic Association, and Nassau County Emergency Management.

The event is free and open to the public.

The Suffolk County Department of Health Services is offering a free course for residents who may be at risk for developing type-2 diabetes.

The National Diabetes Prevention Program will teach participants moderate behavior changes, as studies have shown that successful participants were able to reduce their risk for developing the disease by as much as 58 percent. Participants 60 and older can especially benefit from the course.

"We seek to reverse in Suffolk County the nationwide trend toward increased rates of diabetes. This program addresses the behaviors that contribute to diabetes, a disease that exacts enormous costs to the individual, the family and the community, said Suffolk County Executive Steve Bellone in a release.

"Diabetes puts people at risk for many serious health conditions," said Health Services Commissioner Dr. James Tomarken. "The good news is that moderate changes in lifestyle can result in significant health benefits.'

The program meets for one hour per week for 16 weeks, then monthly for the remainder of one year.

The next session starts 6 p.m. Monday July 18 and continues each Monday after through November 7, with no classes on Labor Day. The classes will be held at the Long Island Help & Wellness Center at 32 Park Avenue in Bay Shore. For more information or to register, call 631-853-2928.
